Introduction

Welcome to the Sideways Sammy Season Preview. Within these 84 pages you will find nearly all the necessary information, analysis and facts to prepare you for the forthcoming league season.

To open this preview I have a few thoughts on what has been another long and difficult summer for the Sky Blues.

I will then take an in-depth analysis of our League One rivals. I will assess their strengths and weaknesses in an attempt to see where Coventry City stand in relation to them.

You will also find in these pages some brief profiles of our squad. I have also provided relevant statistics to see whether we are in an improved positions this season compared to 12 months ago.

I will then assess the tactical options that we have available to us and how effective they could be.

I will then take a look at who will be the key performers for the forthcoming league season. I will also take a look at how our manager has fared over the summer and how he might lead the team to success this year.

Then there will be a look at the new additions to the squad, both the new signings and which young players people should be looking out for.

To close out this guide I will review the team's pre-season games and then turn my eye towards some predictions for both Coventry City and the league in general.

Hopefully this will provide you the reader with ample information to look forward to the season with.

Finally, all information is accurate to the time of writing which is 3rd of August 2014. All ages have been calculated for the 9th August which is when the season begins.

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Opening Words

After a long and difficult summer for the club, the start of the season is just around the corner and it is time to look forward to the football again.

The outcome of the judicial review was not as important as had been expected. The club continues to survive but it does feel in increasingly bad shape. The debacle surrounding the Ricoh Arena continues to roll on but surely we are now approaching the final few scenes.

At the time of writing the club is set to begin its league fixtures in Northampton for another season. For all of the excitement that the new season always brings, it's will be with a depressing sense of reality that those few fans enter Sixfields Stadium on August 16th.

For all of the joy that Steven Pressley's side brought in the opening months of last season, the backdrop of an empty stand at Sixfields was a constant reminder of the precipice of doom that club stands upon. What has been most frustrating about the past 12 months of being a Coventry City fan s the disparity between the quality of the football team and the quality of the

football club as an institution.

With Calum Wilson, Franck Moussa, Joe Murphy, Cyrus Christie and Blair Adams all having departed the club this summer and Carl Baker soon to be on his way, it feels that once again the team is in a weaker position than 12 months ago. After the team coped so badly after losing Leon Clarke in January, there is the sense that the quality of football team is getting closer to being that of the quality of the club.

Yet there have been signs of encouragement for Coventry City fans this summer. The signings of Jim O'Brien and Reda Johnson in particular give the squad a competitive edge and proven level of quality that was perhaps not there last season.

There is hope that Steven Pressley has the raw materials in his hands to finally achieve something this season. Whilst the sum of our squad's parts might arguably be lower than it was 12 months ago, we begin the season already 10 points better off than this point last season.

Let us not also forget the weight of negativity that the club was mired in this time last year. Many were expecting certain relegation after the club was shorn of the spine of a side that had intermittently challenged for the play-offs in the 2012/13 season. We began the campaign with just one recognised central defender and Callum Wilson had only one goal for the club to his name.

Somehow Steven Pressley moulded what looked like a rag-tag bunch of youngsters and senior players no other club would want into an attractive side that could beat any time in the division.

Our manager has had the summer to bring in players who are more-or-less in fitting with his philosophies as a manager. Whilst the languid Carl Baker and Franck Moussa scored over 20 league goals for us last season, they arguably cost us a similar amount with their inability to cover their full-back.

The team this year has much more of an emphasis on hard-work and collective responsibility than last season. Our team last season regularly found themselves engaged in 'goalfests' and runs of defeats where the team looked bereft of confidence. Who is not to say that by adding experience and harder workers to the squad that we might be more consistent and able to take results from games where we have under-performed.

It is poignant then that we begin the season at Valley Parade when things took a turn for the worse during our last campaign. After racing into an early lead we failed to cope with Bradford's determination and physicality which won our opponents a well-deserved point.

Our opening fixture will be a good test of the mentality of this new team. For me this is where the excitement begins. We have no idea how good this team is yet. We now await that big reveal on August 9th to see what we can aspire to as Coventry City fans this season.

Star Player:

Dale Jennings – Initially struggled after making the move from Bayern Munich last season. Benefited from a loan spell at Milton Keynes last season. Could be a real star at this level, offers trickery and can chip in with goals by cutting inside.

Key Signing:

Sam Winnall – Starred for Scunthorpe last season after being released by Wolves. Faces the pressure of proving that last season was no fluke as well as playing at a higher level.

Key Departure:

Chris O'Grady – Tried almost single-handedly to keep Barnsley in the Championship. An intelligent targetman who has moved on to Brighton.

Overview:

Relegation from the Championship long

seemed inevitable for Barnsley. Their squad increasingly looked patched together out of the dregs of other Championship squads. Manager Danny Wilson has spent the summer reorganising and rebuilding the Barnsley squad to overcome years of short-termism at the club.

Players like James Bailey, Ross Turnbull and Dale Jennings should give Barnsley genuine quality at this level of football. The club also have Luke Berry, Conor Hourihane and Kane Hemmings who have been given a chance at a higher level. In addition to some promising youngsters such as Dominic McHale, George Smith and Jack Cowgill, the challenge is for Danny Wilson to build a team out the resources at his disposal. Expect some poor early season form to be followed up with a strong run come winter, in a similar fashion to us in our first season in League One.

Bradford City Last Season: 11th in League One

An impressive start to last season was eventually undermined by a poor run of form in the middle of last season. Ended last campaign in decent form to secure a strong mid-table finish. Are now looking to implement a change of style.

Phil Parkinson – After leading Bradford to two Wembley finals in one season and starting last season strongly, Parkinson faces questions over his style of football following a drop in form from October onwards last season.

Star Player:

James Hanson – Was for a long time the only player Bradford has spent a transfer fee on during an extended stay in League Two. Hanson is a classic target-man who has made Bradford an effective unit over the past few seasons.

Key Signing:

Alan Sheehan – A real ball-playing defender with a wonderful set-piece delivery. A signal of intent from Phil Parkinson to change Bradford's style of play.

Key Departure:

Gary Jones – The captain that led them to two Wembley appearances was a surprise name on Bradford's released list. A real terrier in midfield who offered bite, drive and experience to the Bantams' central area.

Overview:

This summer has seen a shift in recruitment strategy from Bradford boss Phil Parkinson. Gone are most of the team which made Wembley twice two seasons ago, replaced by a number of interesting ball-playing footballers. The signings of Alan Sheehan, Matt Dolan and Billy Knott suggest that the Bantams will be less focused on building attacks around James Hanson and will be looking to keep the ball on the floor.

Given the current lack of squad depth that Bradford have and their attacking options of James Hanson and Aaron McLean, we could see Parkinson eventually revert to type this season. Still, they have made a number of intelligent signings and should not be troubled by relegation. I would not expect anything more than mid-table again for Bradford.

Bristol City Last Season: 12th in League One

After a horrendous run of form at the start of last season, new manager Steve Cotterill evenutally managed to turn things around. Displayed some strong form in the closing months of the season. Now expected to challenge for promotion this time around.

Steve Cotterill – Turned Bristol City from relegation battlers to comfortably in mid-table last season. Should be able to take them even further this season.

Star Player:

Sam Baldock – Last season's League One top-scorer and expected to hang around despite interest from higher up the Football League. An out-and-out goalscorer who should be looking forward to another productive season.

Key Signing:

Luke Freeman – Starred for the past few seasons with Stevenage. A skilful and intelligent forward who can also play out wide.

Key Departure:

Marvin Elliott - Not that he will be missed much by Bristol City fans, Marvin Elliott was key during Gary Johnson's reign at the club. Has largely been in poor form ever since.

Overview:

Bristol City suffered the fate that many relegated clubs fall victim to last

season. Unable to win until the middle of October it seemed that Bristol City were sleep-walking into League Two. Steve Cotterill brought stability when he came in last December and got the squad performing to their expected levels.

This season the challenge is to continue that progress. On paper Bristol City have one of the strongest teams in the division. Their attack of Sam Baldock and Jay Emmannuel-Thomas has been bolstered by the signings of Luke Freeman and Aaron Wilbraham. They have quality and squad depth that few other teams in League One possess. Anything less than the top six should be considered a failure for Bristol City.

Paul Cook – Led Chesterfield quite stylishly out of League Two last season in his first full season in charge.

Star Player:

Sam Morsy – Surprisingly sold by Port Vale following promotion to League One last summer. Was the metronome in midfield for Chesterfield as they won the League Two title last season, could be a real star this season at a higher level.

Key Signing:

Daniel Jones – Sacked by Port Vale at the end of last season. Jones is an attacking left-back who has been very effective at this level.

Key Departure:

Marc Richards – Richards was joint top-scorer last season with just nine goals. Largely regarded as something of a disappointment during his two-season spell with the club, however the Spireites do seem to lack a genuine goalscorer.

Overview:

It seems like Chesterfield are now paying the price for over-spending last season. Despite winning League Two last season, the Spireites have been restricted in the transfer market thanks to disappointing attendances. The team manager Paul Cook has at his disposal is still strong but will be tested more strongly this time round.

Expect then that Chesterfield will turn to players such as Gary Roberts, Jay O'Shea and Sam Morsy to once again produce the goods. They lack a genuine goalscorer in their team but perhaps against opponents less likely to sit back against them, they could make up for this deficiency from last season. The Spireites have potential to surprise many but a lack of a clinical edge in the penalty-area could make this a more difficult season.

Joe Dunne – Stepped in to replace John Ward nearly two seasons ago and has just about kept the U's in the third tier during his spell in charge.

Star Player:

Tom Eastman – Tall centre-back who has been quietly impressive over the past few seasons for Colchester. Offers a real commanding presence at the back which has kept the U's in the division for the past few years.

Key Signing:

Sean Clohessy – Colchester have made a very solid signing in Sean Clohessy. Impressed for a few years with Southend in League Two before being solid in the Scottish top-flight with Kilmarnock.

Key Departure:

Ryan Dickson – Was a regular last season at left-back for Colchester. A very solid performer who offered experience to a young side.

Overview:

Whilst there have once again been no stand-out new signings at Colchester, it has for once been a summer where the squad has arguably improved. At times manager Joe Dunne has looked like creating an enterprising young side but often the team have succumbed to complete losses of form and confidence. Last season was no different with the U's struggling to survive despite starting the season in decent form. A win over a Brentford side who had just won promotion was enough to survive.

With Joe Dunne in charge it seems like Colchester United will always be a side with brittle confidence. Some promising players in Dominic Vose, Sanchez Watt and Craig Eastmond should be doing better than merely treading water in League One. This season could finally see Colchester's squad live up to their potential but ultimately they seem lacking in many areas to do more than battle against the drop.

John Gregory did pretty well to lead Crawley to safety after taking over half-way through last season. Has completely rebuilt the squad over the course of the summer. Are massive unknown quantities for the upcoming league season.

John Gregory – The ex-Aston Villa manager made his return to English league football after a long spell in Israel and Kazakhstan. He kept Crawley in the third tier with the minimum of fuss in his half season in charge.

Star Player:

Josh Simpson – Crawley's captain and one of the few remaining players from last season. A box-to-box midfield player with a decent range of passing.

Key Signing:

Gwion Edwards – Impressed during a six game loan spell last season from Swansea. A young winger with great potential, Crawley did well to secure his permanent signing this summer.

Key Departure:

Billy Clarke – It was strange that Crawley rejected a January transfer bid from Sheffield United to only release Clarke at the end of the season on a free.

Overview:

After the appointment of John Gregory in the middle of the season, Crawley, except for a considerable fixture pileup, managed a mid-table finish in comfort. Since May, Gregory has completely revolutionised the squad at Crawley. It is something of a gamble and bears resemblance to Graham Westley's 'project' at Preston a few years ago.

Aside from a one or two players such as Gwion Edwards and Sonny Bradley. The squad has a thrown together look to it. There are some veterans mixed in with a few who looked destined for non-league football. It could work out and they could be a surprise package, but overall they do not look anything special and may depend upon an ability to keep clean sheets.

Steve Davis – After two seasons of progression during his time at the club, Davis oversaw a season of turmoil at Gresty Road. The pressure will be on Davis to prove that he can return to that early promise in his managerial career.

Star Player:

Matt Tootle - Received a glowing commendation from club legend Dario Gradi at the end of last season for his performances. One of the few players of genuine quality to remain at the club this season.

Key Signing:

Marcus Haber – He's tall and he wins headers, Haber could be an effective target-man at this level. Seems to be a capricious personality and already something of a journeyman at 25 years-old. Needs to settle and find a home at this stage in his career.

Key Departure:

Chuks Aneke – He may have only been on loan last season but the attacking midfielder almost single-handedly kept Crewe in this division.

Overview:

After winning the Johnstone's Paint Trophy in 2012/13, Crewe looked in pretty good shape last summer to continue their path of progression under Steve Davis. However a season which began with rape allegations against several players ended with a final-day battle for survival which was won largely due to the incompetence of other teams.

Going into this season Crewe are amongst the weakest teams. Losing loanee Chuks Aneke was a blow in and of itself but that has been coupled with winger Byron Moore and full-back Kelvin Mellor chosing Port Vale and Plymouth respectively over staying with the club. Their transfer market activity has been sluggish with only three new faces in so far. They will look once again to academy players such as Billy Waters and Ollie Turton to make the step up and help the club survive in this division.

With the former Bristol City man at the helm you would imagine that they will continue to be awkward opponents for anyone stupid enough to underestimate them. The challenge now will be to adjust to being favourites in more games than they are used to.



3-5-2



Steven Pressley has regularly utilised the 3-5-2 formation in pre-season to good results. The benefit of the formation is that it allows the team to play with an extra central-midfielder whilst also having two in attack. The three centrebacks need to be well-drilled otherwise it can create problems, the two wider centre-backs need to mark players whilst the central one is there to cover or protect the defence. It is also important to have attacking wing-backs as well as midfielders who are looking to break into the box, that will require players like Jordan Willis and Conor Thomas to adapt their playing styles slightly.

4-4-2



Our most used formation last season which successfully brought out the best in both Leon Clarke and Callum Wilson. The key to being effective in this shape will be the combination between the two wingers and strikers as well as intensity with our pressing game. The benefit of this formation is that the players are used to it and it allows Pressley to play with both wingers and two strikers. The disadvantage is that it can be exposed by teams playing with an extra central-midfielder. Additionally a lack of pace from our first-choice centre-backs could be more exposed in this formation.

4-4-1-1




Initially this was the shape that Pressley was looking to use when he first came into the club. It would allow Danny Swanson to be played in his preferred position as well as accomodating two wingers. With an extra man in midfield we would be able to create passing triangles more easily. The main disadvantage is that with one-man up front it can be hard to translate domination of the midfield into chances. Our strike-options at the moment do seem to lack a player who could comfortably play as a lone striker.

4-4-2 Diamond



This formation will always bring to mind the Andy Thorn era at the club. Whilst it can produce some very attractive passing football, the system is badly exposed to teams who play with width and/or attacking full-backs. When Steven Pressley deployed it towards the end of last season a lack of off-the-ball movement from the team made it ineffectual. If we can get players who can work hard both in and out of possession it could be a very effective use of our resources. Once again a slow defence and lack of genuine attacking full-backs might make this an awkward formation to use.



Jim O'Brien

Jim O'Brien arrives at the club this summer after turning down the offer of a new contract with Barnsley. The Ireland youth international was holding out for a move to the Championship but his signing displays ambition from Steven Pressley.

O'Brien's main qualities as a footballer are his tireless work-rate and energy. He will run himself into the ground for the team, this quality marks a sea change in the style of winger that we have been accustomed to in recent seasons.

Whilst the likes of Carl Baker and Franck Moussa had their merits in what they provided in an attacking sense. Their lack of defensive cover left the team exposed at the back. It would be interesting to see the goals that the duo provided compared with the amount that they cost the team.


A case in point would be the 2-2 draw with Crawley last January. Franck Moussa had clearly switched off with the team two goals up against what looked like an opposition side low on quality. However Crawley managed to exploit Moussa's half-heartedness,

running at an exposed Blair Adams to mount a late comeback.

With Jim O'Brien in the team we should be expecting to see full-hearted performances for 90 minutes. This will be important for a team which looks on paper to be weaker in many areas than the one last season. It should allow us to close out results and sit on leads rather than sweat in the closing minutes.

It is obvious to many who have watched the team closely over the past season that Pressley prefers commitment from his wingers first. The unceremonious exit of Carl Baker over the summer displays the ruthlessness of Steven Pressley's vision for the first team.

With the budget lower than it was last season, O'Brien also provides a level of quality that is arguably above what we should be affording in our current situation. The move to bring him in shows the force of character that Steven Pressley has over this club. O'Brien should be one of the star names at Coventry City this season.



John Fleck

After signing for Coventry in the summer of 2012 amid much hype. Fleck has taken his time to establish himself as a key player at the club.

He arrived at the club as an attacking midfielder who would operate just behind the striker. However he struggled to impress in that position under both Andy Thorn and Mark Robins. It was only until Steven Pressley moved him into a deeper lying midfield position that we truly saw what Fleck could do.

His form at the beginning of last season was genuinely astounding. He had almost everything you could want for a central midfielder at this level. Not only could he dictate the tempo of games single-handedly but he also was able to get stuck in with the defensive side of the game.


One of the many highlights of the past season was watching the midfield partnership between John Fleck and Conor Thomas. Whilst Thomas provided the energy and hustle when he was on form. It was Fleck who supplied imagination and creativity to the team.

The central axis between Jordan Clarke in defence, Fleck in midfield and Leon Clarke in attack provided the team its beating heart.

The Scot struggled to maintain his form after Leon Clarke left in January. It seemed like the additional responsibility was slightly too much for him as his own performances declined dramatically. Suddenly the partnership of Fleck and Thomas in midfield looked like more of a weakness than a strength, neither seemed to offer much in attack or defence.

With no additional senior central midfielders incoming thus far, Pressley is putting faith in Fleck recovering his form for the start of this season. The level he played at for the first six months of last season was far beyond what many would expect from a League One player. He is one of the few stars from last season to remain at the club.

The hope is that the addition of Marcus Tudgay as well as some defensive covering wingers reduces the burden on Fleck this season. That provides him with the platform to be the star of this Coventry City side. There also comes pressure with that role and his ability to recover his form will be crucial.



Reda Johnson

The appointment of Reda Johnson as captain of the club signalled the beginning of a new era at the club. The team which did so well at the beginning of last season have nearly all moved on. Reda Johnson will be key in shepherding this Coventry City side into a new beginning.

The Benin international has struggled for fitness in pre-season, missing the Italian tour after picking up an injury whilst with his country. This has been cause for concern for Coventry City fans that he might be constantly in-and-out of the team.

His performances in pre-season have been mixed. Against Watford he put in an uncompromising display which really negated the Championship side's attacking threat. When deployed at leftback in the Stevenage game he seemed struggleto stay in position.

Whilst Johnson provides an option at left-back it seems that by far his best position is at centre-back. His extreme physicality which he is not afraid to use is his main quality. He should make the team a more physical proposition than before.

With Bradford City forthcoming in the opening game of the season, Coventry City fans will be able to see how much of an impact he will have on the team. Our opponents will no doubt be looking to exploit James Hanson's height which won them a point last November. Reda Johnson could be key in shutting off that option.

Reda Johnson as a choice as new club captain symbolises the change in emphasis at the club. There should be less of the highs and lows of the Carl Baker-era of captaincy. What we will hopefully see is genuine leadership and calmness about the way we play.

The choice of a defender as the leader in the side also emphasises the focus on defence for this season. Johnson should give the team a voice on the pitch which should help close out points in difficult fixtures.

Finally, Reda Johnson's community work, rewarded by the PFA award for player in the community this year, shows the quality of man we have signed as well as the quality of player. It speaks of more considered approach to player recruitment than last season.



The Manager

Last season Steven Pressley built a
Coventry City side that looked to have
broken through the typical assumptions
that Sky Blues fans have of their team.
However the loss of Leon Clarke and a
subsequent drop in form due to poor
signings in the transfer market, has led
to some doubting his ability as a
manager.

The argument is that he inherited a group of players that were a cut above their opponents. The team could play at a lower level of intensity and get away with it due to a moment of magic from an individual player.


Given the way the team struggled after losing Leon Clarke, there are questions now over Pressley's ability to recruit the right players to improve the team.

With a more limited playing squad than the one he began last season, the key will be coaxing out a high-level of intensity from his players in every game. Whilst he has undoubtedly got the best out of a few players last season, the team would regularly seem to start games in a state of lethargy, requiring a kick up the arse at half-time to play to their expected levels.

From looking at our pre-season performances, any drop-off in the commitment in our performances could be punished more severely this season. Jim O'Brien, Danny Swanson and John Fleck seem like the only three players in the squad capable of producing something from nothing. The overall quality of the collective has to improve this season.

With the prospect of a return to the Ricoh Arena in mind, there could be a whole set of fans unaccustomed to Steven Pressley's style of management and far less patient with the team. It could really alter the season and potentially put Pressley in the position of having to win fans over again should the club return to Coventry.

Dealing with current set of realities for this coming season though, whilst Pressley undoubtedly did a remarkable job this season, he now has to produce what he did for most of last season over an entire campaign. There is the potential for this to be a really memorable season at the club despite all the difficulties. It will be a test of all of Pressley's qualities as a manager to make a success out of the resources he has available to him.



Top Scorer

Signing of the Season

Young Player of the Season Josh Brownhill (*Preston North End*) –

The youngster has been heavily involved in the club's pre-season schedule. A genuine play-maker who gives Preston another dimension beyond the repetitive work-rate and consistency in the rest of the side.

Surprise Package

Scunthorpe United – They may have lost Sam Winnall to Barnsley but in Lyle Taylor and Paddy Madden they have a strike-force that could catch many in this division out.. The spine of their team is ultra-solid and strong. Scunthorpe could have a similar impact as Port Vale did last season.

Underachievers

Walsall – After losing several key players this summer, the replacements do not look to be of similar quality. They are yet to source a defensive leader to replace Andy Butler. Their new strikers Ashley Grimes and Tom Bradshaw both have relatively poor scoring records in recent seasons.
